LANDSCAPE ARCHITECTS

BETTER PLACE BRADFORD

Better Place was a three year project delivered in partnership between Better Start Bradford and Groundwork to involve local people and develop safer and healthier places for expectant parents and families with children under four years old to increase their access to outdoor spaces.

Groundwork Yorkshire were the lead landscape architects for the project, **improving a range of green spaces** throughout Bradford. These spanned from a small snicket leading to schools, to larger heritage parks.

Pockets of green spaces and playgrounds were either discovered by the team through research or were nominated by a member of the public for improvement. The community team organised public consultations and co-design sessions where information was gained about the site and it's land users. Parents of small children were especially considered in these consultations to gain a more accurate image of what should be proposed for young ones.











FOLKESTONE STREET

This playful area in **Bradford** boasts a wealth of features stretched along the pedestrianised section of the street. The Yellow Bric 'Road' themed path guides people to different areas where children can interact and absorb a variety of sensory experiences whilst being encouraged to keep fit. Features include artistic metalwork, stone carvings, stepping stones, balance beams, hoops, games markings, tree planting, successional bulb planting and tree dressing. There were various workshops and consultation exercises to engage as many of the local community as possible.

LAISTERDYKE LIBRARY **COMMUNITY GARDEN**

As part of Better Place Bradford, Laisterdyke Library was selected as one of the areas of improvement. The community garden was in poor condition and had very few interventions that would draw children in. There was also a problem with dog fouling which was addressed by installing a 1.8m high Ivy green screen around the boundary, blocking access for the animals. The screens, along with Thuja hedges, also pick up pollution particles from the roads as well as create a greener boundary.

A **story area** with a shade sail was designed as an appropriate place for children to read books, tell stories and play. A bare foot trail and mud kitchen were also installed increasing the play factor of the library garden.

BREATHE EASY SCHOOLS

To help tackle the issue of **air pollution** around schools, we worked in partnership with Balfour Beatty on the 'Breathe Easy' project. By using **nature-based solutions** and the expertise of our landscape architects, we created a natural barrier to make the air cleaner for the school children who breathe it.

Along with volunteers from Balfour Beatty and Sunbelt Rentals, we worked within **Seacroft Grange Primary School**'s playground to create a green barrier of
Western Red Cedar hedging plants and Birch trees to help trap the fine particulates from vehicle emissions.

SUSTAINABLE SPACES

Central England Co-operative group has teamed up with Groundwork UK to create a range of different **spaces on land** around its own retail stores and funeral homes funded by their plastic carrier bag levy fund.

The **Dodworth** store was chosen as one of four pilot projects which transformed part of its car park into a new **community space**. A much needed, accessible slope from car park level up to the High Street side has been incorporated, along with **picnic tables**, **stepped timber planters** with **flowering plants**, **herbs**, **sensory species** and **fruit trees**. This has softened the space, provided year-round colour and created an attractive meeting place for residents and visitors. Artist **Adrian Moakes** was also commissioned to design sculptural elements around the theme of **biodiversity** which appear throughout the site.

AIR QUALITY SCHOOLS

Five schools in Bradford were selected for boundary improvement measures with the goal of reducing pollution levels entering the school grounds and affecting children attending them. Exposure to these particles for undeveloped lungs can have lasting negative effects and Groundwork's aim was to reduce this risk.

The focus areas were around boundaries where pollution from vehicles is more likely to affect children such as fences facing main roads and car parks close to where children play. We planted **Thuja hedges**, **Ivy screens** and **trees** which have been proven to capture the smaller particles.

The project was completed successfully and children and teachers at one school were so pleased that they wrote thank you letters from each year group.

REIN PARK

This play area was created as part of the overall masterplan for the park which has been developed with the local community. The site has a long history of vandalism so careful thought went in to the equipment chosen. The play area is unique, being in a linear formation running through the park.

We worked with St Matthew's Primary School to extend the nursery area playground to make use of a neglected piece of adjacent land. The existing brick wall was removed and the earth remodelled to create a gentle slope to the new play space. We also built green screens to help filter out pollution from the nearby busy road. A new multi play unit with slide and a tree seat was installed along with bamboo planting to create lots of outdoor spaces for the children to enjoy.

JUBILEE HALL PLAYGROUND

This play area was installed in the grounds of the youth centre in Rawdon to replace the remains of a run-down playground and includes equipment for all ages.

HAINSWORTH PARK

A small play area in Farsley was in need of an update but rather than excavating the existing one, a new area was created next to it, allowing children to enjoy both.

The proposed design took a **naturalistic** approach, combining a mix of traditional play equipment, boulders and planting. Funding from Friends of Hainsworth Park allowed for trees to be planted, giving a more natural feel.

The use of wet pour was minimalised and reserved for just a few pieces of play. The rest of the play pieces used grass matting, allowing grass turf to grow through.

HAREWOOD PLAY AREA

A play area has been created in this once overgrown neglected part of **Harewood**. The planning process was challenging due to the site being in a conservation area but all obstacles were overcome to create an exciting **play space** for all ages to enjoy.

The play area is well integrated into the landscape with **timber play equipment** for a natural feel. We installed equipment suitable for toddlers and younger children, **nature trails** and **artwork**, outdoor **gym** equipment and a **tennis court** along with disabled parking, **wildflower** areas and we also planted **trees** in the area.

VENTNOR STREET COMMUNITY GARDEN

Our work in Ventnor Street allowed us to engage with the **community**, with emphasis on the **Bangladeshi women** and children to show that they can be empowered to make things happen. The space was previously neglected and was transformed into an **oasis** for the whole community to enjoy.

To get the community involved, we held **art workshops** to create mosaic tiling and steel screens with an Islamic theme.

A film was made showing the progress of the project and we held an opening event attended by local councillors and members of the community. The film was also showcased at the National Science and Media Museum in Bradford.

Reducing waste and promoting positive environmental behaviours among communities and businesses.




Goal 13: Climate action
